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because childhood is not only culturally but also legally and biologically understood as a period of dependency it has been easy to dismiss children as historical actors by putting children at the center of our thinking about american history karen s nchez eppler recognizes the important part childhood played in nineteenth century american culture and what this involvement entailed for children themselves dependent states examines the ties between children s literacy training and the growing cultural prestige of the novel the way children functioned rhetorically in reform literature to enforce social norms the way the risks of death to children shored up emotional power in the home how sunday schools socialized children into racial religious and national identities and how class identity was produced not only in terms of work but also in the way children played for s nchez eppler nineteenth century childhoods were nothing less than vehicles for national reform dependent on adults for their care children did not conform to the ideals of enfranchisement and agency that we usually associate with historical actors yet through meticulously researched examples s nchez eppler reveals that children participated in the making of social meaning her focus on childhood as a dependent state thus offers a rewarding corrective to our notions of autonomous individualism and a new perspective on american culture itself

during the nineteenth century european women of all countries and social classes experienced dramatic and enduring changes in their familial working and political lives however the history of women at this time is not one of unmitigated progress theirs was an uphill struggle fraught with hindrances hard work and economic downturns and the increasing intrusion of the public into their innermost private and personal lives breaking away from traditional categories rachel g fuchs and victoria e thompson provide a sense of the variety and complexity of women s lives across national and regional boundaries juxtaposing the experiences of women with the perceptions of their lives three themes unite this study the tension between tradition and modernity the changing relationship between the community and individual the shifting boundaries between public and private dealing with individual women s lives within a large social and cultural context fuchs and thompson demonstrate how strong and courageous women refused to live within the prescribed domestic roles and how many became the modern women of the twentieth century

edward sugden s emergent worlds explores the topics of so called interludes in various books that have originated in nineteenth century america

nineteenth century american authors critics and readers believed that biography had the power to shape individuals characters and to help define the nation s identity in an age predating radio and television biography was not simply a genre of writing says scott casper it was the medium that allowed people to learn about public figures and peer into the lives of strangers in this pioneering study casper examines how americans wrote published and read biographies and how their conceptions of the genre changed over the course of a century campaign biographies memoirs of pious women patriotic narratives of eminent statesmen mug books that collected the lives of ordinary midwestern farmers all were labeled biography however disparate their contents and the contexts of their creation publication and dissemination analyzing debates over how these diverse biographies should be written and read casper reveals larger disputes over the meaning of character the definition of american history and the place of american literary practices in a transatlantic world of letters as much a personal experience as a literary genre biography helped americans imagine their own lives as well as the ones about which they wrote and read

the development of the american nation has typically been interpreted in terms of its expansion through space specifically its growth westward in this innovative study thomas allen posits time not space as the most significant territory of the young nation he argues that beginning in the nineteenth century the actual geography of the nation became less important as americans imagined the future as their true national territory allen explores how transformations in the perception of time shaped american conceptions of democratic society and modern nationhood he focuses on three ways of imagining time the romantic historical time that prevailed at the outset of the nineteenth century the geological deep time that arose as widely read scientific works displaced biblical chronology with a new scale of millions of years of natural history and the technology driven clock time that became central to american culture by century s end allen

analyzes cultural artifacts ranging from clocks and scientific treatises to paintings and literary narratives to show how americans made use of these diverse ideas about time to create competing visions of american nationhood

this is the first book to explore the history of french theater in the nineteenth century through its special role as an organized popular entertainment traditionally regarded as an elite art form in post revolutionary france the stage began to be seen as an industry like any other and the theater became one of the few areas of employment where women were in demand as much as men in this lively account hemmings examines how the theater world flourished and evolved and reveals such matters as the difficult life of the actress salaries and contracts and the profession of the playwright

with cheaper publishing costs and the explosion of periodical publishing the influence of new world travel narratives was greater during the nineteenth century than ever before as they offered an understanding not only of america through british eyes but also a lens through which nineteenth century britain could view itself despite the differences in purpose and method the writers and artists discussed in nineteenth century british travelers in the new world from fanny wright arriving in america in 1818 to the return of henry james in 1904 and including charles dickens frances trollope isabella bird fanny kemble harriet martineau and robert louis stevenson among others as well as artists such as eyre crowe all contributed to the continued building of america as a construct for audiences at home these travelers stories and images thus presented an idea of america over which britons could crow about their own supposed sophistication and a democratic model through which to posit their own future all of which suggests the importance of transatlantic travel writing and the idea of america to nineteenth century britain

offering an examination of the paragone meaning artistic rivalry in nineteenth century france and england this book considers how artists were impacted by prevailing aesthetic theories or institutional and cultural paradigms to compete in the art world the paragone has been considered primarily in the context of renaissance art history but in this book readers will see how the legacy of this humanistic competitive model survived into the late nineteenth century

the bonds of matrimony describes with cruel precision the social and political status of married women in the nineteenth century women

of all classes had only the most limited rights of possession in their own bodies and property yet as this remarkable book shows women of all classes found room to manoeuvre within the narrow limits imposed on them upper class women frequently circumvented the onerous limitations of the law while middle class women sought through reform to change their legal status for working class women such legal changes were irrelevant but they too found ways to ameliorate their position joan perkin demonstrates clearly in this outstanding book full of human insights that women were not content to remain inferior or subservient to men

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
